Description of the workshop

This workshop will cover all the aspects of the transition of neonates from 23 to 32 weeks gestation at birth and after care on the neonatal unit of life in the first few weeks. The day will comprise a mix of innovative teaching methods (reverse classroom teaching, videos, low and high-fidelity simulation).

Precourse material will cover the European neonatal resuscitation guidelines and will help build your foundations prior to course delivery.

Training on the day will reinforce practices through task training and videos. Simulation will help provide experiential learning to consolidate skills and practice. The emphasis will be on improving your nontechnical skills like situational awareness, leadership and communication in this environment as well as providing high quality neonatal care.
